Freshman Pam Hartzel comments that the qualified students are often passed by "because they don't run around with the popular cliques or aren't showy enough to draw attention.

In the opinion of Janet Klocker, sophomore, "The prevalence of dependent thinkers at RRHS has forced our school elections to become popularity contests

An anonymous junior asks in return: How can you tell if a student is qualified?" Carol Williams felt the same way when she queried, "Why not have campaigns and elections as they do in other schools?"

On the other side of the question, Lynn Wiesenberger felt that "often the most popular are the best qualified. Popularity is usually based on leadership, dependability, capability, and a way with people. "

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# Pirates Defeat Bulldogs: Close Season Friday 

Taking an early 16 point lead, the RRHS Varsity Football Team rolled to an easy 23-6 victory over the Olmsted Falls Bulldogs at River, Oct. 18.
The victory raised the Pirates Southwestern Conference record to 3-2-1. It also snapped a three game winless streak and primed the team for the conference clincher against first place North Olmsted at North Olmsted, Fri., Oct. 25.
Fullback Dave Kergaard opened the scoring with a seven-yard run. This was the climax to a drive initiated on the Olmsted 49. Quarterback Judd Horbaly scrambled in for the extra points.
The second River TD was the end result of a 67 yard march. Halfback Bob Cross went the final 13 yards for the score. Kergaard plunged for the extra points.
The defenses took over at this point and the second and third quarters were scoreless. After the start of the fourth period, Olmsted Falls finally reached the scoring column.

Halfback Cornett took a short screen pass from quarterback Radigan and displayed a fine piece of running in going 54 yards for the score.
The Pirates final TD was scored by halfback Jeff Stark who raced 25 yards to make the score 22-6. Steve Myers added the extra point by bouncing the ball off the upright and over the crossbar.
A sad note to the victory was the injury to quarterback Horbaly. He was ably replaced by junior Tom Gdovin. Horbaly is expected to be ready for the North Olmsted game.
Two River fumbles helped the Fairview Warriors defeat the Pirates for the first time since 1954.
The Warriors opened the scoring in the second quarter when hard-running quarterback Jack Reed scored from the 5 . He also added the extra points.

River closed the gap when Stark took the ensuing kick-off 85 yards. The extra points attempt failed and Fairview held a 2 point lead.

Reed increased the Fairview lead by plunging two yards for his second TD. The extra points attempt was successful and the score at the half was Fairview 16, River 6.

River scored the only touchdown of the second half in the third quarter when Kergaard went in from the 10. Stark completed the scoring by adding the extra points. The final score was Fairview 16, River scor
14.
River played host to its archrivals, the Bay Village Rockets, Fri., Oct. 4.
Jeff Eakin gathered in a 23 yard pass in the end zone from Horbaly and Vince Gandolfi added the two points to give River a first period lead.

Tom George set a new varsity record for River on the course with a time of 9:36. Terry Kelleman set a new sophomore record with a time of 9:45 and Doug Miller set a new freshman record with a time of 10:06.
River's relay team placed third out of 16 teams at the Brush Invitational meet, Oct. 19. A trophy was awarded to each member of the team which consisted of John English, Joe Massa, John Boros, Terry Kelleman and Tom George.
River defeated Elyria, 18-45, on the 2 mile West Tech course, Oct. 17. George placed first with the winning time of 10:33.
The milers were defeated by John Marshall, 21-37, Oct. 15. George came in second out of 61 runners with a time of $10: 14$.
At the Bowling Green Invitational Relays, River placed twenty-ninth out of the 51 teams participating. Boros, who finished eighth in his heat, had the best time for River which was 10:59.
